

Salish Weaving Workshop with Semiahmoo Artist Roxanne Charles

Teacher's Guide

Grades 4–6

Introduction:

This program offers the opportunity to learn about Coast and Straits Salish culture through the contemporary presence of the Semiahmoo First Nation on the Peninsula. Students will hear stories, explore artwork by Semiahmoo artists and carvers, and engage in a contemporary Salish weaving activity led by Semiahmoo artist Roxanne Charles.

Objectives:

- To provide students with an interactive Salish plaiting/weaving activity using recycled materials, led by indigenous artist, Roxanne Charles.
- To provide living examples of Salish culture and Semiahmoo First Nation culture and understanding.
- To engage in discussion about the world from an Indigenous perspective.

Pre-Visit Instructions

If possible, please have your class watch this 5 minute video called <u>Cen'Alien</u>: Carving the Posts.

If you require a break for snack-time during your visit, please let us know ahead of time and we will incorporate this into the schedule for the day.

BONUS: Collect plastic bags and cereal boxes. We will repurpose these materials during the program.

Payment



About the Program Leader: Roxanne Charles

Roxanne Charles is a mixed media artist and educator of Strait Salish and European descent. She is an active and proud member of Semiahmoo First Nation in Surrey, British Columbia where she promotes art, language, and culture. Roxanne is a contemporary storyteller whose goal is to touch, move, and inspire others through her work.

Section 2: Outline of the Program

- Welcome and Introduction (5 minutes): Roxanne welcomes the class to Semiahmoo territory and gives context about who she is and the plan for the day.
- Walk to P'Quals (30 mins weather permitting): Roxanne gives further context to Semiahmoo Bay, the Semiahmoo First Nation and shares stories about the landscape.
- Presentation in the Gallery (30 mins): Roxanne provides an interactive PowerPoint presentation about Semiahmoo traditions and culture, public art, and traditional Indigenous artwork that students and teachers can visit afterwards.
- Interactive Salish Weaving Activity (40–50 mins): Roxanne leads the students through how to plait and twin—two salish weaving techniques. Students practice both techniques using recycled materials and construct a medallion they can take home.



• Reflection/Closure (5 minutes): Students will participate in a reflection/closing discussion.
